THINKING ABOUT BAPTISM? Are you thinking about a baptism for your child? Or are you thinking about being baptized yourself? During the morning service on **Sunday, January 8**, we will celebrate the sacrament of baptism for all those who desire to receive it. If you have baptism in mind for yourself or your child, and if you have not already spoken with one of the ministers or scheduled a date, please contact Karin Case or Dan Smith to discuss the possibility of participating in this (or a future) baptism Sunday.

FAMILY NIGHTS IN EPIPHANY Tuesdays, 5:30 - 7:00 p.m., January 3, 17, 31 and February 14, Sage Hall Families with young children are warmly invited to our biweekly pasta-and-potluck suppers in Sage Hall, our indoor playspace. We gather to share a meal and share a bit of our lives as the kids play and the parents try for a bit of grown-up conversation. Our Family Nights in Epiphany will remain informal and “un-programmed,” but look forward to a Lenten series of Family Nights in March and April, when we will meet weekly for five sessions, with an adult program component in the Well.

COME CELEBRATE EPIPHANY! Friday, January 6, 6:00 p.m., Margaret Jewett Hall Epiphany (“manifestation”) is a Christian feast so ancient that it predates Christmas. It celebrates God’s self-revelation in Jesus. It is a season of light shining in darkness, a time when the wise leave their books to seek a child, wine brims from clay water jars, and the voice of God rings in our ears: “You are my beloved, my child, my delight!” This year’s dinner will be potluck through and through. You are invited to bring a main dish casserole (names beginning with A-H), a salad or side dish (names beginning with I-M), dessert (N-R), or drinks (S-Z). After our feast and a brief gathering ritual in the Chapel, we will set off together on a candlelight journey through the darkness, until we arrive at the Sanctuary and circle it with light. Under the dome in the chancel we will renew our own baptismal promises, ending with a joyful “sprinkling” of all present. This event is for all ages, so gather up friends, neighbors, kids, and come share the light! *All are invited to bundle up and join us on Epiphany, promptly at 5:45 p.m. on the church lawn, as we renew our witness against gun violence. We will offer a reading of names, before we remove 2016 flags and share a brief prayer for peace in our city and nation.*

“LORD, PREPARE ME” - EXPLORING SANCTUARY AT FIRST CHURCH Sundays, **January 8, 15, and 22, 10:00 a.m., Hastings Room** Join members of the Mission and Social Justice team for an important conversation about how First Church can participate in the growing Sanctuary Movement. How can we be ready to offer, or assist other congregations in offering sanctuary to those at risk of deportation or who are otherwise feeling unsafe in our current political reality? And, how can we find a sense of spiritual sanctuary for ourselves in the midst of political turmoil and upheaval? As part of these sessions, Tony Alkhoury, a friend of First Church and current Harvard Divinity School student from Syria, will share his powerful story.

OPIOID ADDICTION AND PREVENTION FORUM Sunday, **January 8, at 12:30 pm, Hastings Room** Opiate deaths across the nation continue to soar. In Massachusetts, five people die from an opiate overdose each and every day. Currently, there is insufficient access to treatment for those seeking an exit from addiction, and public health and addiction experts are calling for 1) increased access to treatment services, and (on an emergency basis) increased availability to “harm reduction.” Join us as Sarah Casey from Victory Programs provides an introduction to the current crisis and the efforts that are being pursued to address it. Training and provision of Narcan will be part of the program for those interested. Being knowledgeable about when and how to administer Narcan helps make it possible for YOU to be more immediately and effectively involved in the efforts to address the current public health epidemic.

NEWCOMERS LUNCHEON Sunday, **January 15, at 12:30 p.m., McKenzie Library** If you’re new (or feeling new) to First Church, looking for ways to get involved, seeking information about our church or our denomination (The United Church of Christ), or interested in meeting others who are new to the church, or in connecting with some folks who already know their way around: this luncheon is for you! The third Sunday of every month we host a Newcomers Luncheon where you can meet our ministers and members, learn about our history, explore membership, learn about opportunities for service and action in the community, and hear about our faith formation and educational programs. On January 15 we’ll take a fresh approach to our Newcomers Luncheon and invite church members to join newcomers in conversation about living our faith in the world. All are welcome!
