THE SITUATION IN SOUTH SUDAN

Famine has officially been declared in South Sudan and, for the first time in recent history, there is a very real possibility of four famines - in Somalia, South Sudan, Nigeria, and Yemen - breaking out all at once. Twenty million people face starvation within the next six months. International aid officials warn that this is one of the biggest humanitarian disasters since World War II. Increased investment in international humanitarian assistance at this moment is critical to assist these people in crisis. Continued funding for peacebuilding programs that prevent violent conflict are also critical to addressing root causes of poverty and famine.

To address the current famine, the global humanitarian community is ready to scale up the response to avert a catastrophe, but requires additional funds immediately to do so. Let's do our part through our prayers, generous contributions, and advocacy with the U.S. government to release emergency funding to meet the catastrophic needs of these four countries and support robust funding for diplomatic, development, and peacebuilding tools, which are critical to our security, and to the well-being of others around the world. We must act now, before it is too late.

Trusted, on-the-ground partnerships enable the church around the world to get food resources directly to the people who need them. UCC Disaster Ministries already has sent \$85,000 generated through the 2017 One Great Hour of Sharing Offering funds to the ecumenical ACT Alliance and IMA World Health for famine relief. Support provided to ACT Alliance means food, nutrition supplements, safe water, sanitation, fast-maturing seeds, farming tools, and support to keep pupils and teachers in school. Through IMA World Health we deploy mobile clinics, therapeutic feeding and medicines, and are supporting partners like Sudan Medical Care.

Advocate! Call your members of Congress today and ask them to save lives in these four countries by maintaining robust foreign assistance funding in the 2018 budget, Thank you in advance for your help in staving off famine.

Capital Campaign: Events and Updates

for such a time as this grants: LETTER OF INTENT DEADLINE JUNE 15 A core commitment of the capital campaign has been that a tithe—10% of the funds raised—will go to support mission grants. This spring, the *for such a time as this grants* committee will begin soliciting proposals for projects that will extend First Church's mission into the wider community. We will look to our members to find promising projects both within our community and beyond our own walls. Information on the grants program is posted on the church website, and grants committee co-chairs Caitlin Anderson and Leslie Pelton-Cairns are available for questions. The first step in submitting a proposal is to submit a brief letter of intent, due June 15, 2017. Applicants will have approximately another month to complete the remainder of the proposal.

WHAT TO EXPECT DURING CONSTRUCTION The capital campaign renovations are scheduled to start on June 5 and continue through early October. The busiest months will be July and August, and in September the contractors will be involved mostly in finishing work.

- **Tree Removal in Preparation of Capital Campaign Renovations** Not only will the church building look quite different in October, but our outdoor space is getting quite the makeover as well. We will have a new pathway, an enclosed playground, new plantings, and more. In preparation for this work, the trees and bushes right in front of the bike rack will be removed on May 30. Our longtime arborist Trumbull Barrett and his team have been hired to perform this task and as usual they are approaching the project with care. The removal should be complete in one day. If you have any questions, please contact Don Johnson or Kirsten Manville.
- **Newtown School and Outside Events** Newtowne School is not holding its summer program, and the building has not been booked for any outside events. Because of this we have decided it makes sense to close the building each weekday in the late afternoon, and at 2:00 p.m. on Saturdays in July and August. On Sundays the building will be open its usual hours, from 7:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m., and we will hold both our morning worship and Night Song services.
- **Access to the Building** There will always be access to the building when it is open. Entrance and exit points may change depending upon which area of the building is being worked on, and some areas of the building may be off-limits at certain points in time. The construction will be loud and noisy, and staff are currently thinking through what we can all do to make our environments as conducive to working as possible. This may include working off-site at times.

As with most construction projects things can change unexpectedly. However, we are doing such careful planning with our contractor we hope this will happen rarely, if at all. If it does, we will communicate these changes to you in a timely manner. And please do not hesitate to let us know if you have any questions or concerns about the upcoming renovations.
