Annual Meeting last week, Peggy Stevens updated us on how plans are evolving for a project related to our church's slaveholding legacy. This still-unfolding work is, at once, calling us to reach out beyond First Church, while also prompting us to examine our internal structures and ways of being through an anti-racist lens. #### DAN SMITH AND CARLYLE STEWART AMONG LEADERS OF MONTGOMERY PILGRAMAGE

Carlyle and Dan will join City Mission Boston and Old South Church in Boston in leading a pilgrimage to the National Memorial for Peace and Justice in Montgomery, Alabama. The purpose of this journey is to acknowledge the living legacy of white supremacy in our country, learn the history of white racial violence from Reconstruction to Jim Crow, and begin to appreciate the importance of resisting modern day racism and system injustice in our lives and community.
