These past few weeks have brought home to all of us the vital importance of working together to slow and limit the spread of Coronavirus. We know we are called to be a community of faith, not fear. We also know we are called to care for the most vulnerable in our midst, to be good stewards of our staff and resources, and to be good citizens of the wider community.

Under normal circumstances, people of faith would care for each other by drawing close together. It's what we do. It's who we are. In times of loss or threat, we respond by coming together to pray and to sing, to hug and hold each other tight.

UPDATED INFORMATION

Dear First Church,

Grace and peace to you. We write with an update about our upcoming worship schedule and our building closure. In our ongoing efforts to limit the spread of coronavirus, and following the guidance of state and local officials, our building will continue be closed through May 4. All in-person worship gatherings, events and meetings will be suspended during this time. While we are currently targeting May 4, we will continue to monitor developments in the state and follow the guidance of government officials.

We will continue to live-stream our worship services from the sanctuary, led by two or three staff who are committed to modeling physical distancing. Other worship leaders will join remotely.

The First Church Shelter will remain open through this time. With help from the City of Cambridge and the dedication of our shelter staff, the Shelter is now open 24-7 to support our guests and keep them as safe as possible. Shelter operations have been expanded to Sage Hall to allow for physical distancing precautions.
