These past weeks have brought home to all of us the vital importance of working together to slow and limit the spread of Coronavirus. We know we are called to be a community of faith, not fear. We also know we are called to care for the most vulnerable in our midst, to be good stewards of our staff and resources, and to be good citizens of the wider community.

Under normal circumstances, people of faith would care for each other by drawing close together. It's what we do. It's who we are. In times of loss or threat, we respond by coming together to pray and to sing, to hug and hold each other tight.

Pandemics are different. During an outbreak such as the one we are facing now, we are called to care for each other by moving farther apart, creating a holy buffer of social distance. We do this not only for our own safety and the safety of the people around us, but in loving stewardship to our wider world.

Even when apart, we are not alone. God is with us, in every heartbeat, every breath: strengthening, comforting, and upholding us. Christ is with us, walking beside us, sharing our trials, speaking peace to our fears. The Spirit is with us, uniting us one to another across the barrier of physical distance.

These are temporary measures only. They won't last forever. We will rejoice and celebrate all the more when we are able to come back together, to share stories of what it was like, to laugh, to cry, and to share hugs and handshakes again. Until then, day by day, let's hold one another in prayer.



The only portions of this mass spoken and in English are the lessons and the sermon. There is an extra event at the close of the mass when the altar party moves outdoors to bless a cross that has been re-gilded and will be returned to the rooftop of the church this week.

Sadly, this is happening to various clergy across the country. This is a scam. Please do not respond. Dan or other First Church staff would never ask for any kind of donations to be sent directly to him (or directly to others). Any such donations would be channeled through First Church. Please also note that if the sender is using an email address other than an @firstchurchcambridge.org address, it is most likely a scam. The scammers have been able to pull enough information from church websites to make the email sound legitimate. Scams have become more and more sophisticated! If you are still wondering, please be sure to speak directly with Dan or to the staff person involved before responding.

BUILDING CLOSURE As we begin to consider First Church's re-opening and our re-entry, we continue to follow the guidance of the City of Cambridge. The City continues to postpone, cancel, or shift to online formats all city-sponsored meetings through at least May 31. Therefore, First Church's building will remain closed (with the exception of worship leaders, First Church Shelter staff and guests, and Friday Cafe staff and volunteers) during this time period, as well. All church-sponsored and wider community events hosted in our building will continue to be postponed, cancelled, or shifted to online formats through the month of May. HOW TO MAKE A BETTER FUTURE: PERSPECTIVES AMIDST A PANDEMIC

Sundays, May 17, May 31, and June 14, 12:30 p.m., via Zoom

Join us for a series of hour-long Zoom sessions led by First Church members Ed Baker, Laurie Burt and Bill Hsiao. They will share stories and reflections about finding hope amidst the Covid-19 crisis and about how we can work together towards building a better society. Following a short presentation each week, there will be a brief follow-up conversation amongst Ed, Laurie and Bill, as well as a time for questions from participants on the call.







Sunday, May 17: On Public Health and Leadership

Ed Baker, former Assistant Surgeon General in the US Public Health Service and former Director of CDC's Public Health Practice Program Office, currently serves as Adjunct Professor in Health Policy and Management at UNC and Adjunct Professor of Environmental Health at Harvard Chan School. Ed is a board-certified physician and was trained in epidemiology in the CDC's Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS) and at Harvard School of Public Health.

Sunday, May 31: On Climate Change

Laurie Burt, former commissioner of the MA Department of Environmental Protection and vice chair of the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), currently offers independent strategic advice on clean energy, climate and environmental policies to foundations, non-profits, businesses and government throughout the country. Laurie has practiced environmental law for over 30 years and serves on many boards including the Union for Concerned Scientists, CERES, and the American Repertory Theater.

Sunday, June 14: On Fixing Health Care

Bill Hsiao is an economist who teaches at Harvard School of Public Health and has studied health care systems for more than forty years. Besides the State of Vermont, he designed reforms of national health care systems for nine countries. Presently he serves on the Governor's Commission on Healthy Californians for All at the invitation of California Governor Gavin Newsom. He wrote an article in the January/February 2020 Foreign Affairs called *How to Fix American Health Care: What Other Countries Can—and Can't—Teach the United States.*

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID FOR COVID-19 TRAINING, OPEN TO ALL ONLINE Sometime during the month of May, Mental Health Awareness month, claim an hour or so of time to engage in this free, hour-long online Mental Health First Aid training from the American Red Cross: https://tinyurl.com/ya3xvnxt. Here's a little about what to expect in the training:

Mental health first aid is the practice of recognizing and responding to people experiencing crisis-related stress and can be performed by anyone. The uncertainty associated with a global health crisis like COVID-19 challenges everyone's ability to cope. This course will help you to build resilience and support yourself and others through this crisis by reviewing basic principles of providing psychological first aid, including how to recognize and manage stress in yourself and in others and how to lend support to family members, friends and coworkers during and following the COVID-19 outbreak.

Through this course, participants will:

- Explore how to care for themselves and others during times of stress and crisis.
- Recognize signs of stress in themselves and others.
- Understand the basic principles of practicing mental health first aid.
- Recognize the importance of self-care during times of stress and crisis.
- Develop appropriate strategies for managing stress related to the COVID-19 outbreak.
- Develop appropriate strategies for supporting family members, friends and coworkers during the COVID-19 outbreak.

And aside from the particularity of the pandemic, this training is just generally helpful in preparing to be a good caregiver to your loved ones and peers and to care for yourself in the process!

The American Red Cross training is text-based. So if you'd prefer text and video and someone talking you through a training (in a Kiwi accent!), you are encouraged to access the "Psychological First Aid during COVID-19" training offered on YouTube through the New Zealand Red Cross.

We will offer a Zoom call on June 1 at 4:00 p.m. to discuss your experience with the training and any questions or concerns that came up for you.

These trainings offer us an opportunity to use our time of physical distance from one another to prepare ourselves to become more skillful and compassionate caregivers.
