### Grounded in God • Growing in Community • Acting in Love

These past weeks have brought home to all of us the vital importance of working together to slow and limit the spread of Coronavirus. We know we are called to be a community of faith, not fear. We also know we are called to care for the most vulnerable in our midst, to be good stewards of our staff and resources, and to be good citizens of the wider community.

Under normal circumstances, people of faith would care for each other by drawing close together. It's what we do. It's who we are. In times of loss or threat, we respond by coming together to pray and to sing, to hug and hold each other tight.

We do this work relying on God's help and knowing that we cannot do it alone.**

**REPORT ON GREATER BOSTON INTERFAITH ORGANIZATION'S (GBIO) RACIAL JUSTICE CAMPAIGN** Congrats to the 2000+ leaders in GBIO member institutions and beyond who “put feet to their faith.” They acted in this critical moment to push forward a holistic racial justice agenda, and our collective work has helped move key legislation into joint conference committees where final bills are being negotiated between the House and Senate. The bills in joint committee include:

- **POLICE REFORM.** A bill on comprehensive police reform including enhanced police training with certification/decertification through POST, reform to qualified immunity, and statutory limits on excessive use of force
- **HEALTHCARE.** A bill that expands telehealth, makes progress on mental health parity, and provides temporary relief from surprise out-of-network medical billing
- **HOUSING.** A bill that extends the moratorium on evictions/foreclosures for 12 months and provides relief for small and nonprofit landlords

We will monitor as the bills in conference committee proceed and send action alerts as needed. Please see [THIS LINK](#) for a full report and summary of the GBIO's 2020 Racial Justice Campaign. Santo Domingo de Silos Abbey is a Benedictine monastery in the village of Santo Domingo de Silos in the southern part of Burgos Province in northern Spain. The monastery is named after the 11th-century saint Dominic of Silos, but dates back to the 7th century. The monks there are currently internationally famous for singing Gregorian chant. Their technique is surpassed by other choral ensembles, but the singing has a wonderful vibrancy and is musical.
