Hybrid Adult Formation: Jesus, Our Center Today, 12:15 - 1:15 p.m., MJH and <u>via Zoom</u>



Changes to Masking Guidelines at First Church in Cambridge

On March 14, we lifted our indoor mask requirements, except during communal worship and church choir rehearsals, where masks are still required. Outside of worship, we encourage people to make their own decisions about whether to mask, honoring what they feel is best for them and the wider community. *Due to an expected increase in the number of people worshiping in person, as well as our plan for robust singing, we will continue masking in the Sanctuary through Easter.* <u>Read the full announcement here.</u>

LOOKING AHEAD TO HOLY WEEK

Our 40-day journey with Jesus, Our Center, culminates as we turn toward Jerusalem and to the powerful, somber, mysterious, yet ultimately joy-filled events of Holy Week. This year, we pay special attention to blessing the ties that bind us together and weave us into one community in Christ!

Each of the stories we read—from Palm Sunday through Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter—include powerful references to fabric and thread. We plan to "weave" this symbol into our Holy Week liturgies and rituals, and we look forward to offering everyone a simple hemp bracelet to be worn throughout the week. 
