



- We pray for First Church Shelter staff, guests, and family members who are grieving the loss of Shelter guest George McKenna, who died unexpectedly in Harvard Square recently.
- We pray for all who are in treatment for cancer: Anita Anger; Judith Semmler, Alice Napoleon Jones's mother; Penny Kilburn, Nancy Kilburn's mother; Karen Anne Zee's daughter Becky Collet, and her sons-in-law, Denis Collet and Stewart Bailey; Beth and Polly, Ann McCann's sisters; and friend of Homeless Ministries Brian O'Donovan.
- We pray for all those grieving the loss of life and the destruction caused by Hurricane Ian, as well as for the people of Puerto Rico as they continue to recover from Hurricane Fiona.

- We pray for those experiencing the loss of vital reproductive rights across the nation, and all those who care about them, especially as threats of a national abortion ban loom.
- We pray for the people of Ukraine as they continue to live through war and heightened concern of escalation.
- We pray for all who are affected by COVID-19, especially as case counts rise in our area.
- We pray for the 14 men who are finding sustenance and protection in our First Church Shelter, and we pray for the guests of the Friday Café, who are finding food and listening ears. We pray for all who are experiencing deprivation and hardship in these uncertain times.

will lead as we share in weekly reflection about the parables of






Here Lies Darby Vassall Film Premiere Wednesday, October 12 at 6:00 p.m. Christ Church, Cambridge








Invitation to Contribute to Coffee Hour


Adult Formation: The Doctrine of Discovery Sundays, November 13 & 20, 9:30 - 10:15 a.m.
