


First Church Land Acknowledgment







COMMUNITY PRAYERS

- We pray for the world-wide Roman Catholic communion, upon the death of Pope Francis. May all know the faith, hope, and love that were hallmarks of Francis's life and ministry.
- We prayfor First Church friend Ted Hansen who is recovering from skin graft surgery after being badly burned last week.
- We pray for all who are living with significant health challenges and their families and caregivers: Poppy Coffin, who is experiencing Alzheimer's Disease; Carter West, who is experiencing a chronic neurological disorder; and Keith Manville, who has atypical Parkinsonism. We also pray for those in treatment for cancer: Dana Hunt, Claire Morgan's mother; Ellen Smith, Devin Hansen's aunt; Judith Semmler, Alice Napoleon Jones's mother; Karen Anne Zee's daughter Becky Collet and her son-in-law Stewart Bailey; and Beth and Polly, Ann McCann's sisters.
- We pray for the hundreds of people who have been illegally removed from the US and transferred to a maximum security prison in El Salvador, where they face grave human rights violations. We pray for their families, and for all those who are living under the daily threat of detention, and especially for the immigrant communities in Chelsea, Fall River, and New Bedford, where ICE has increased their presence. We pray also for international students at universities across the US who have had their visas pulled and who are being detained or deported. We pray for the safety of Tufts graduate student Rumeysa Ozturk and other students facing detention for exercising their right to free speech. We pray for the future of our democracy, as we witness alarming abuses of power.
- We lift up our near neighbor, Harvard University, in the midst of a confrontation with the federal government over academic independence and freedom of speech; and we pray that their courage in this moment continues to inspire other institutions to speak truth to power.
- We continue to celebrate the dignity and worth of our trans and gender non-conforming siblings who are experiencing an onslaught of prejudicial discrimination condoned by the current administration. We affirm that all of us are beloved in the eyes of God, just as we are.
- We continue to pray for our earth and for all creation in the face of the climate crisis, especially as NOAA and the scientific research arm of EPA are both decimated by staff firings and defunding.
- We continue to pray for peace in Eastern Congo, where millions are displaced due to the fighting between the Rwandan-backed M23 militia and the Congolese army. We pray that the children and staff of the Congo Peace School will be safe, and that God's presence may be with them and all the loved ones of Amani and Amini Matabaro Tom.
- We pray for Gaza, especially for those mourning loss of life and of medical care with the bombing of al-Ahli Hospital in Gaza City on Palm Sunday. We also pray for the people of Sumy and Kyiv, Ukraine, where recent Russian attack killed over 40 people and injured many more. We pray for all who are grieving, as we continue to bear witness to the terrible impact of ongoing war in Gaza, in Ukraine, and in other regions of the world trapped in cycles of violence.
- We pray for the 14 men finding sustenance and protection in our First Church Shelter; and we pray for the guests of the Friday Café, who are finding resources and listening ears.





In 2022, we set up an assets working group to help get a clear picture of some of our important historic assets which included archives material, the cockerel weathervane, and the Parsonage. As a congregation, we have made decisions on how to handle those first two items and we are now at a point where it is time to think about the future of the Parsonage, the house at 44 Garden Street that is owned by First Church to serve as a residence for the Senior Minister. This is an important aspect of our pastoral transition as we will need to have a clear plan for how to provide housing support when we call a new Senior Minister.

Executive Council appointed a small working group to explore options for the Parsonage as a property and related issues about pastoral housing. This working group has been engaged over the past few months in information gathering related to local real estate, current-day expectations for pastoral housing, and related issues. The group is now planning a series of listening sessions to get the insights and thoughts of the congregation to guide the development of some options for us to consider.

We encourage as many people as possible to participate in one of these sessions. In preparation, we hope you will take a few minutes to think about



the ways in which we use the current house on Garden Street, the principles or values that should guide how we provide housing support to our pastor, and how these questions figure into our long-term sustainability as a congregation.

If you are not able to attend a session or have other questions related to this process, please don't hesitate to reach out to one of the working group members directly with your thoughts or concerns.
