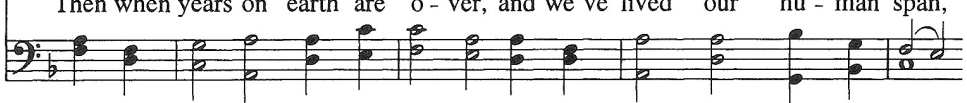

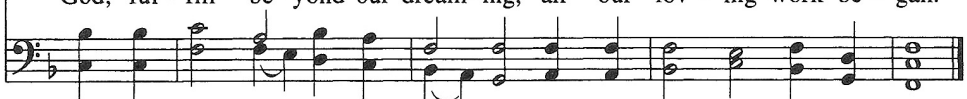

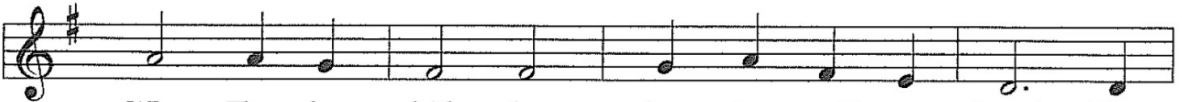

## COMMUNITY PRAYERS

- We pray for Alice Napoleon-Jones and her family as they mourn the loss of her mother Judith Semmler, who died on Thursday, October 9, after a long battle with cancer.
- We pray for Amani and Amini Mataboro Tom, friends of First Church who have settled recently in Kenya, as they take in the difficult news that Amini's uncle was killed recently in Congo.
- We pray for the family and friends of Kevin Stanley, who died last week. Kevin had been a guest of the First Church Shelter and had moved to permanent housing in April.
- We pray for a friend of the church undergoing treatment for advanced cancer, and for her 12-yr-old son, feeling all the stresses of the situation.
- We pray for Lya Williams Howard, a newcomer to First Church, who is in the hospital because of her kidney disease.
- We pray for Devin Hansen's cousin Rob Dencola, who has been diagnosed with colorectal cancer.
- We pray for all who are living with significant health challenges and their families and caregivers: Poppy Coffin, who is experiencing Alzheimer's Disease; Carter West, who is experiencing a chronic neurological disorder; Katy Bauer, Sunnessa Schettler's mother, who is experiencing COPD; and Keith Manville, Kirsten's father, who has atypical Parkinsonism. - We pray for the island nations in the Carriibbean, including Jamaica and Cuba, in the aftermath of Hurricane Melissa.
- We pray for all those impacted by the federal government shutdown, including those who are losing their jobs, those losing their SNAP benefits, and those who are concerned about looming cuts to health care subsidies.

- We pray for US cities under continuing threat of militarization by our federal government, including Portland, Oregon, and Chicago, Illinois.
- We continue to celebrate the dignity and worth of our trans and gender non-conforming siblings who are experiencing an onslaught of prejudicial discrimination condoned by the current administration. We affirm that all of us are beloved in the eyes of God, just as we are.
- We pray for people around the world trapped in cycles of violence, especially all the innocent victims of the deadly power games of political rulers. We pray with hope for the people of Gaza as Israel and Hamas take steps to exchange hostages and move toward a ceasefire.

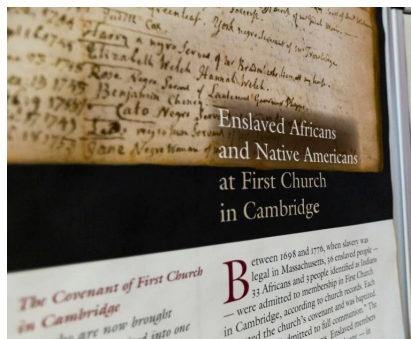
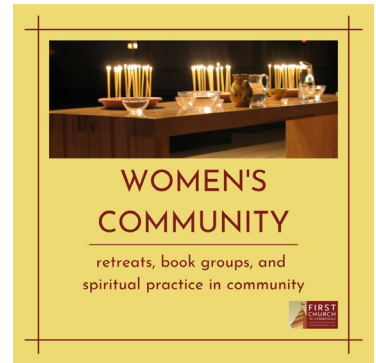
### Women's Community Book Group

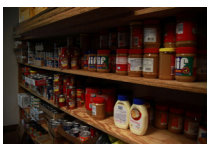
